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

After you read Bob Cropp's Dairy Situation Outlook in this newsletter, you may get the notion to look into the Dairy Margin Protection Plan as the forecast for milk prices are changing. The sign-up for this program has already begun, but will end on September 30th. If you want to know more about this program you will have a variety of opportunities. On August 13th, Dr. Mark Stephenson from the Center for Dairy Profitability will be talking about the program and coverage level selection tools at the Angelica Town Hall (N3285 County Rd C, Pulaski) at 7 pm. Scott Reuss, Marinette County Agriculture Agent, will also be hosting local meetings on this topic throughout September. The September edition of the newsletter will have more information about these meetings.

We have a variety of local meetings which may be of interest to you. On August 6th, join us for a Cow/Calf Meeting at the Roy and JoAnn Wilcox farm (8077 County Road S, Pulaski) for a farm tour and discussions of calf weaning, body condition scores, and parasite management. Registration information is located in this newsletter. The cost is \$15. Please let me know if you are interested in attending by phone as we have plenty of room for everyone!

On September 9th, UW-Extension is hosting a Start 'Em Right, Raise 'Em Right calf management workshop at Birling Bovines (N8128 Town Hall Road, Black Creek). Interactive sessions include: ultrasound respiratory scoring, manual respiratory scoring, calf sanitation audit and farm tours. Register with Brown County UW-Extension, 920-391-4610.

The first of the corn in the area has started to tassel. The next installment of the UW-Extension Ag newsletter will be timed to be ahead of corn silage sampling days—typically 45 days after tasseling. Oconto and Marinette County Fairs are approaching quickly. Please make sure to take time out of your busy schedule and encourage our youth by attending the fair. The agenda will include a farm tour, meal, and speakers. Speaker topics will include preventing and managing parasites, body condition scoring, and weaning. Attendees of the meeting will qualify for one continuing education credit for Beef Quality Assurance recertification. The meeting will be held August 6 starting at 9:30 a.m. at Roy and JoAnn Wilcox Farm, located at 8077 County Road S, Pulaski. Farm Bill Dairy Margin Protection Program

Mark Stephenson, Director of Dairy Policy Analysis at UW-Madison will be our speaker. He will cover the details of the program and how it relates to northeast Wisconsin dairy producers. The program will be held at 7:00 pm on August 13th at Angelica Town Hall, N3285 County Rd C, Pulaski.

Additional local meetings will be hosted by Scott Reuss in September. More detailed information about these meetings will be included in the September edition of the UW-Extension Ag newsletter.

Wisconsin Farm Technology Days

If you have not already heard, Wisconsin Farm Tech Days will be held August 25th through the 27th at Statz Bros. Inc, Sun Prairie. County agents have been working hard on educational display plots and farm tours. Make sure and stop by and see UW-Extension's educational information at the 'Education Station' in Tent City.

Spooner Sheep Day

The 63rd Annual Spooner Sheep Day will be held at the Spooner Agricultural Research Station on Saturday, August 22, 2015. Registration will open at 8:30 a.m. at the Station Headquarters (W6646 Hwy 70, Spooner, WI 54801). The educational program will start at 9:15 a.m. and end at approximately 3:30 p.m.

The program will be a mix of reports of sheep research results and timely topics for the sheep industry. Featured speakers this year will be Cody Hiemke, B.S. and M.S. in Animal Sciences from UW-Madison and current Lamb Program Manager, Niman Ranch (a natural meats company) and Dr. Kay Nelson, D.V.M from UW-Madison and current veterinarian for the herds and flocks of the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. Cody will lead a discussion on the production of a quality market lamb and the benefits to both the producer and the sheep industry of producing such lambs. Dr. Nelson will discuss some of the more common sheep health issues she has seen at the UW-Madison sheep units at both the Arlington and Spooner Stations with recommended preventive measures and treatments. Two graduate students working with the sheep program at Spooner (Tom Murphy and Vera Ferreira) and the 2015 summer student intern at Spooner (Emily Petzel) will present results of several projects they have been working on including the Use of Estimated Breeding Values in Predicting Future Performance of Sheep, the Effect of Breed and Hybrid Vigor on Lamb Survival, and a Novel Approach to Controlling Internal Parasites in Lambs. The program will conclude with an open house at the sheep farm in the afternoon that will focus on a discussion among participants on sheep facilities and handling innovations.

A lamb lunch will be served at noon at a cost of \$8.00 per adult, \$5.00 for children ages 5 to 11, and free for children under 5. Advanced reservations are not required.

Spooner Sheep Day has a long tradition of providing useful information to the state's sheep producers and is the longest-running agricultural field day of the many held each year by the University of Wisconsin-Madison,

<u>Start Them Right, Raise Them Right Calf Management Meeting</u>

More and more farms are investing in newer facilities and technologies to raise pre-weaned calves. With new technologies come new management practices.

Wednesday, September 9, 2015, UW-Extension Dairy Team will be hosting "Start Them Right...Raise Them Right" Calf Management Seminar to help producers enhance their calf management program. The meeting will be held on-farm at Birlings Bovines, N8128 Town Hall Road, Black Creek, WI. Featured presenters include UW-Extension Animal Well-being Specialist Amy Stanton on "Management of Group Housing", UW-Extension Oconto County Agriculture Agent Sarah Mills-Lloyd, DVM, on "Your Mother Was Right! Cleanliness is Important to Calves", Vitaplus Dairy Youngstock Technical Specialist Noah Litherland on "Five Steps Towards a Proactive Approach to Achieving Greater Transition Calf Success" and UW School of Veterinary Medicine Theresa Ollivett, DVM on "Thoracic Ultrasound and Bovine Respiratory Disease". Included in the meeting will be interactive sessions on manual and ultrasound calf respiratory scoring, calf sanitation audits and farm tours. The program is open to any individuals with interest regarding calf management. The fee for the program is \$35 per person which includes materials and lunch. The purpose of this newsletter is to provide information directly to farm employees to help them improve their dairy cattle knowledge, maintain farm safety, and improve their way of life.
