Seminar Speakers

Mr. Bruce Feinberg serves as Senior Director, Worldwide Quality for McDonald's Corporation. Bruce has served on several McDonald's councils: McDonald's Global Quality Leadership Board, Animal Welfare Council, Socially Responsible Food Supply Initiative, Global Food Improvement Team's and was responsible for developing McDonald's Guiding Principals and Global Standards for Animal Welfare. He has led initiatives to improve the customers experience "across the counter", developed a global produce food safety strategy focusing on pre-farm gate produce food safety, and is responsible for directing McDonald's Global Animal Health and Welfare team. Feinberg is a graduate of the Pennsylvania State University with a BS in Animal Science.

Dr. Lily Edwards-Callaway is the head of Animal Welfare at JBS USA. She grew up in Rhode Island and completed her B.A. in French at Amherst College. She received her Master's degree at the University of Rhode Island, studying behavior and welfare of captive zoo species. Prior to joining JBS to oversee the company's animal-welfare programs, Edwards-Callaway earned her PhD studying under Temple Grandin at Colorado State University focusing on understanding and minimizing pre-slaughter stress of swine and served on the faculty at Kansas State University.

Mr. Denny Harding is the Executive Director of the Iowa Farm Animal Care (IFAC) Coalition. In this role, he manages and coordinates efforts that address concerns and questions regarding farm animal care in the state of Iowa. He currently serves on Iowa State University's Department of Animal Science External Advisory Committee and is the Bio-Economy Manager at the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation. Prior to joining Farm Bureau in 1999, Harding operated a corn and soybean farm in Calhoun County in which he is still involved. He also served as director of value added agriculture for the Calhoun County Economic Development Corporation and was instrumental in the formation of the Agricultural Development and Promotion Foundation which serves North Central Iowa.

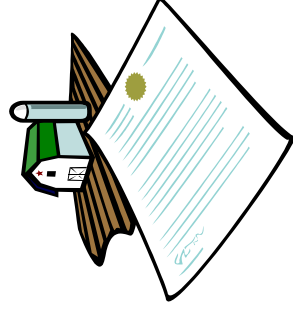
